



MICHIGAN DNR:

Muskegon River anglers should be on the lookout for Michigan Department of Natural Resources personnel collecting walleye eggs below Croton Dam this spring. Electrofishing boats will be on the water this week, starting Thursday, March 25, and work should conclude by April 16. People who want to avoid the walleye collection activities should fish downstream. The DNR asks the public to use caution when fishing near the electrofishing boats. Anyone, wading nearby when the boats approach, will be asked to exit the water to ensure everyone's safety. To maintain effective social distancing and allow fisheries staff to safely, efficiently collect eggs, the DNR also asks people not to gather at egg collection sites. The annual Muskegon River egg take is a critical operation for statewide walleye management, said Jim Dexter, DNR Fisheries Division chief. They are planning to collect about 32 million walleye eggs during this effort.

I would like to take a few minutes and share some of the resources I have been using over the last few years both for tying and for fishing. I plan to include a pick from each of three areas books, online videos/tutorials, and websites that I have found helpful.

Library:


A.K. Best, Production Fly Tying – Whether you are just beginning or have been tying for years, you can probably pick up a new tip or trick from this book. I have enjoyed the attention to proportions and the tips for tying in all sorts of fly components from tails and wings to various hackles. His book has helped me improve my tying by improving my consistency whether I am tying a hundred flies for the Tie-a-thon or 3 flies for my next bluegill outing. Knowing that my 1st and last flies are going to be good also improves my confidence in the flies.


Online Tutorials:

This spring I wanted to learn to tie better streamers, as I looked around on the internet, videos from Gunnar Brammer kept showing up in my searches. Gunnar is an up and coming tier from Duluth, MN. He has a series of baitfish streamers based on a standard he calls "The Chosen One". If you are interested in tying streamers and learning about proportions, shading, and functional designs, check him out at Youtube.com\Gunnar Brammer. Websites:

Last but not least, www.panfishonthefly.com, is a great site full of tutorials, fly patterns, a fly fishing blog, and recently a shop providing some of the tools and materials to tie some of his featured patterns. The blog posts usually detail fishing trips with a particular fly, how he was fishing it, the pattern, and the steps to tie the fly. If you have a few minutes and can't make it to the water, check out this site and plan for your next trip.







Mississinewa River "Spring Fishing"

One of my favorite times of the year is upon us. The days are getting longer and the birds are once again singing their songs just before the break of daylight. I fished for walleye on the shores of the Maumee River between Maumee and Waterville, Ohio as the walleye had made their annual trek into the rivers and creeks that feed into Lake Erie to spawn. First the males and then the females make the journey. Then about this time of the season the females have spent their eggs and both male and female are beginning to head back to the Lake. When the marble-eyes have done their thing this sets in motion many events that are in the near future. The largemouth bass and smallmouth bass are on a feeding frenzy. The bluegills are readily available to take both on top water and subsurface flies, mostly subsurface until the water warms a little more. The crappies are on a good bite and then there is the "white bass" run. This is probably the closest link to the walleye movement, which could be set in motion with an egg timer. When the walleye move out the white bass move in. I am not talking only the Maumee River but the Mississinewa River, which is close to my home. I guess you could consider it my home river. I have fished this river for most of my life and some of my best memories of fishing it were with my two boys from the time they first held a pole in their hands to just last year, and now with my grandkids. When the water warms to between 45 and 55 degrees the white bass move from the Reservoir into the river to find a suitable spawning area. The fish will congregate in schools on shoals and shallow rock beds for a period of three to four weeks. During that period you are at the mercy of the spring weather due to the rainy conditions affecting the water height, clarity and the Mississinewa Dam downstream for flood control.

I am specifically talking about a stretch of river between, Four Mile Bridge north of Marion to Lafontaine, about a 12 mile stretch of water. This area is part of the Mississinewa SRA and is controlled by the DNR. In this area is where the Battle of Mississinewa took place and there are several historical Indian sites. There are several designated locations on the river to put in and take out kick boats, canoes, kayaks, or johnboats. There are numerous spots along the both sides; more access on the east side of the river to bank fish or areas to wade in and walk upstream and downstream. The current is usually not to fast so wading is fairly easy. Of course, I have my favorite spots. There are also regular boat ramps on the river and the Reservoir that you can trailer a boat and motor upstream to these locations. Remember these are schooling fish so if you catch a white bass while floating you may want to stop and get out and wade. You can fish from , Matter Park to Four Mile Bridge, or from Troyers Bridge all the way to the LaFontaine ramp, or the Highway #13 Bridge. There is also good fishing all the way from the Dam down to Peru. When the white bass are "in" you can catch 40 to 50, 1lb-2lb bass within a half day. It is a blast! The White Bass move up river to spawn, a couple weeks later the Crappie will move up the river to spawn so they are both in there. After a couple weeks the White Bass move back to the lake and then the Crappie move back to lake. Then about this time the lakes are starting to warm up and the Bluegills are fanning the beds and the Bluegill bite will be on. With all this going on it creates a major problem, do I fish or do I go mushroom hunting or both? You can stoop to the lower level of spin fishing if you want to enjoy all the fish activity in the Mississinewa River and Lake year round. Ice fishing has its moments also. This river is not just a good fishery in the spring but through the summer and fall you can catch white or black crappie, bluegill, largemouth bass, smallmouth bass and some white bass that remain in the river and don't move back out to the Lake. I have even caught rainbow trout back in August 2003, when they released trout in the tail waters of the Dam. These are not striped bass or hybrid striped bass that look similar. They aren't too bad on the table if caught when the water is cold.

I have maps of the area if you would like one and if you decide to take this adventure you might want to give me a call about the water conditions and if I am available I could spot you or a group for a float trip since I do live nearby. You can also contact me anytime to see what the water conditions are. It won't be long the White Bass will do their annual thing.

Abdomen: Natural Red Fox Squirrel Belly Hair or Wapsi Natural Fur Red Fox Squirrel Belly Dubbing Thorax: Natural Red Fox Squirrel Body Hair or Wapsi Natural Fur Red Fox Squirrel Body Dubbing Head: Uni-Thread, Camel, Rusty Brown or Orange, 6/0 or 8/0 (hook size)
