

BLACK CADDIS EMERGER

- HOOK: TIEMCO 2487, #14-#18
- THREAD: BLACK, 8/0
- BEAD: TUNGSTEN, BLACK, 3/32 OR MATCH HOOK SIZE)
- BODY: MARABOU, BLACK, 5-6 STRANDS
- RIB: SILVER WIRE, SMALL
- HACKLE: PARTRIDGE
- COLLAR: OSTRICH HERL, BLACK, 2 STRANDS



CURLYS SUPER BUGGER (OLIVE)

- HOOK: MUSTAD 3906B, #8
- THREAD: OLIVE, 6/0
- EYES: DUMBELL, SMALL, LEAD, YELLOW/BLACK PUPIL
- TAIL: MARABOU, OLIVE GRIZZLY
- TAIL: KRYSTAL FLASH, FLUORESCENT CHARTREUSE (4 STRANDS)
- ABDOMEN: ANTRON DUBBING, MEDIUM OLIVE
- THORAX: ANTRON DUBBING, LIGHT OLIVE
- HACKLE: SADDLE, OLIVE, PALMERED
- COLLAR: PHEASANT AFTER SHAFT, OLIVE
- HEAD: ANTRON DUBBING, LIGHT OLIVE
- LEGS: SILI-LEGS, BARRED OLIVE/BLACK, (4)







UNDERSTANDING FLY TYING THREAD SIZES

I have been tying flies for more years than I can remember or would care to admit. Like many that enjoy this form of art, I have sometimes been confused trying to understand and compare thread sizes. When I first started tying, many of the common threads were designated by a letter size. "G" was a good high strength size usually used for spinning deer hair. I still have a partial spool of this stuff. You could really pull on it and not be too concerned with it breaking. We also had the "Aught System." 3/0, 6/0 and 8/0 were the most commonly used sizes. But unlike fish hooks, the larger the number on the spool, the smaller the thread's diameter and its breaking point.

While 6/0 was the standard size used in most tying recipes, 8/0 was called out for the very small flies or used when there was a large number of different materials used in a pattern. The Classic Atlantic Salmon flies are good examples where 8/0 would be used. I have seen some of these recipes call for 14/0. As easy as I can break 8/0, I can imagine trying to tie with 14/0. If you needed to get really small, UNI makes a 20/0 thread. This is a single strand thread and has a breaking point of 3 ounces. For comparison, 6/0 breaks at about 16 ounces.

One problem with the Aught designation was that one brand of 6/0 might be slightly different in specifications to another brand. Even the breaking strength might vary slightly. Using 6/0 nylon for this example, Danville's brand of 6/0 has a slightly larger diameter than Wapsi's. The breaking strength of both brands is similar. This brought us the "Denier System."

So what is a Denier? Without getting too technical, the Denier designation is based on the weight in grams of a 9000 meter length of the thread. The larger the Denier number, the larger the thread diameter and the greater its breaking point.

Confused yet? So am I and I'm the one writing this article. So I'll give you a quick, general comparison reference. 70 Denier is similar to 8/0 and 140 Denier compares to 6/0. Or simply put, the larger the Denier number, the heavier the thread. Remember that point and your tying headaches shouldn't get any worse.

I sometimes buy tying materials on line from J. Stockard Fly Fishing. I have always been pleased with their prices and service. Their web page is https://www.jsflyfishing.com. They sent out this comparison chart that I have found it quite helpful. While it doesn't cover it all, it does compare most of the thread brands readily available here in the United States. I trust you will find it as useful as well.

In the meantime, pour yourself 2 fingers of single malt and keep tying. "May the inside of your waders (or boats) always be dry!"
